- 10 Cornell has held its opponents to single-digit goals 10 times this season, earning a victory each time.
- 9 The Big Red has posted a perfect 9-0 record when leading at halftime.
- 8 Cornell owns an 8-1 record all-time vs. the current members of the Great Western Lacrosse League.
- 7 Seven Big Red players have reached double-digit points this season – Ryan Hurley (57), John Glynn (39), Max Seibald (31), Chris Finn (30), John Espey (25), Chris Ritchie (22) and Kyle Doctor (12).
- 6 Cornell has advanced to the NCAA tournament six times during Coach Tambroni's eight-year tenure.
- 5 Max Seibald has the fifth-longest point scoring streak in the nation, tallying at least one point in the last 33 contests.
- 4 Cornell had four players named first-team All-Ivy – Ryan Hurley (unanimous), John Glynn (unanimous), Max Seibald (unanimous) and Matt Moyer.
- 3 Ryan Hurley needs just three goals to move into Cornell's single-season top-10.
- 2 Two Big Red players were named honorable mention All-Ivy – John Espey and Nick Gradinger.

THE MATCHUP — The No. 7/8 Big Red will play host to No. 12/11 Ohio State in the opening round of the 2008 NCAA men's lacrosse tournament, on Saturday, May 10, at Schoellkopf Field. Cornell heads into the tournament as the Ivy League's automatic qualifier after finishing the regular season with an 11-3 overall record and a mark of 5-1 in the conference. The Buckeyes (10-5, 4-1), which finished the season as tri-champions of the GWLL, earned an at-large bid to the NCAA tournament after losing to Notre Dame, 9-2, in the conference championship game.

TOURNAMENT TIDBITS – Cornell's 24 NCAA tournament victories rank seventh all-time, while its 21 appearances also stand seventh ... Only six teams have more national titles than the Big Red ... This season marks the sixth time that Cornell has made it to the NCAA tournament during Coach Tambroni's tenure, making it to the quarterfinal round three of the last four trips.

SERIES HISTORY VS. OHIO STATE — Cornell and Ohio State will face off for just the third time in the history of the two programs, and the first time since the 2001 season. The series is tied 1-1 with each team winning on its home field. Cornell, under former head coach Dave Pietramala, took the 11-5 victory in the first meeting in 2000, while the Buckeyes defeated Jeff Tambroni's squad, 8-7, the following year in Columbus.

LOOKING AT THE BUCKEYES — The Buckeyes bring a 10-5 mark into the NCAA tournament despite dropping two of its last three games, both to Notre Dame. Included was a 9-2 loss in its last contest in the finals of the Great Western Lacrosse League tournament. The GWLL regular season tri-champion Buckeyes entered that contest with the Fighting Irish ranked second nationally in scoring offense and had a string of 11 consecutive games scoring in double figures, averaging 13.0 goals per game. GWLL Player of the Year Kevin Buchanan leads the way with 40 goals and 29 assists, while Joel Delgarno had 37 goals and 32 assists for 69 points. OSU has struggled at the face-off circle this season, winning just 42 percent of its starts with Nick Carr taking a majority of the opportunities. Stefan Schroder has started all 15 contests this season in between the pipes with an 8.21 goals-against average and a .578 save percentage. He has made 159 total saves and leads the team with 47 ground balls. Among OSU's big wins this season are victories over NCAA qualifiers Colgate, Denver and North Carolina. Head coach Joe Breschi is in his 11th season on the sidelines and has led the Buckeyes to three NCAA tournament appearances in the last five seasons and has won four GWLL titles.

CORNELL VS. THE GWLL – The Big Red is 8-1 all-time vs. the current members of the Great Western Lacrosse League, thanks in large part to a 5-0 record vs. Notre Dame. Cornell is a perfect 1-0 vs. both Denver and Air Force, and 1-1 vs. Ohio State. The Big Red has never faced Bellarmine or Quinniac.

THE LAST TIME VS. OHIO STATE — Galen Beers had three goals to lead Cornell, but it wasn't enough as Ohio State held on to defeat the Big Red 8-7 at Jesse Owens Memorial Stadium before a crowd of 1,213. The Big Red jumped up 1-0 less than two minutes into the game but, OSU responded quickly as Sandy Boyce tied the score at 1-1 with 10:04 left in the first quarter. For the next eight minutes, both squads played cautious and had few scoring chances, but then OSU exploded for three goals. The second quarter opened with OSU a man down for three minutes because of an illegal stick and during the three-minute span the Big Red tallied twice, with goals by J.P. Schalk and Michael Egan, but OSU scored a short-handed goal, and the Buckeyes escaped the penalty with a 5-3 lead. Both teams traded goals to finish the quarter and OSU took a 6-4 advantage into the locker room at the intermission. In the third quarter, the Buckeyes pushed the lead to 8-4, Cornell wasn't done and Beers connected for his second goal of the game at the 4:20 mark. Egan gave the Big Red an emotional lift, scoring with 44



COVER BOY – Junior Max Seibald was featured alongside Duke's Matt Danowski on the front of the February edition of *Inside Lacrosse* magazine. The magazine used dual covers to feature the top four players in the country with Seibald and Danowski on one, and Paul Rabil (Johns Hopkins) and Ben Rubeor (Virginia) on the other. COLUMBUS, Ohio — Galen Beers had three goals to lead Cornell, but it wasn't enough as Ohio State held on to defeat the Big Red 8-7 at Jesse Owens Memorial Stadium before a crowd of 1,213.

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In the third quarter, the Buckeyes pushed the lead to 8-4, Cornell wasn't done and Beers connected for his second goal of the game at the 4:20 mark. Egan gave the Big Red an emotional lift, scoring with 44 seconds left on the third-quarter clock.

Both defenses worked hard in the final quarter, allowing the offenses few opportunities. Beers made it a one goal game at 9:32, but the Big Red couldn't get any closer, as the Buckeyes held on for the 8-7 win.

Justin Cynar played all 60 minutes in goal, and made six saves in the game. The Big Red's offense challenged OSU goalie Tony Russo the entire game, as Russo made 14 stops in the contest.

In overall statistics, OSU had 32 shots to the Big Red 23 and also had 30 ground balls to Cornell's 26. The Big Red dominated on faceoffs winning 13 of the 18 in the game and also went 4-of-5 on man-up opportunities.

- be the fifth straight win for Cornell over a GWLL team.
- make Cornell 2-1 all-time, while improving Coach Tambroni's record to 1-1 vs. Ohio State.
- improve the men's lacrosse record to 25-17 in NCAA tournament games.
- make Cornell 9-1 all-time vs. GWLL teams.

A FAMILY AFFAIR — Ohio State sophomore Patrick Hansen's father, Patrick '78, was a three-year letter winner for the Cornell football team.

CHAMPIONSHIP LINEAGE – Three players currently on the Cornell roster have fathers that have won a national championship with the Big Red – David Lau (George '78), Julian Levine (Jon '76) and Shane O'Neill (John '76). George Lau was a two-time winner as part of both the 1976 and 1977 national championship squads, while Jon Levine and John O'Neill joined him on the 1976 team. Only Maryland can boast a similar roster anomaly as current team members - Brian Farell, Brian Phipps and Travis Reed – had fathers (Mike, Wilson and Jake, respectively) – that were teammates on Maryland's 1975 title team.

THE BIG RED, THE NCAA'S AND OVERTIME — Cornell's 12-11 victory over Albany in the 2007 NCAA quarterfinals improved the program's record to 2-1 all-time in NCAA tournament play when a game goes to overtime. The Big Red won a 16-13 triumph over Maryland in the championship game in 1976 and dropped a 9-8 contest in the 1980 quarterfinals to Virginia.

WHAT CAN BROWN DO FOR YOU? – When Brown defeated Princeton on May 3, Cornell became the Ivy League's representative to the NCAA tournament with the automatic qualifying bid by virtue of its victory over the Bears.

FORGET BROWN ... WHAT CAN GREEN DO FOR YOU? – If it weren't for Dartmouth's stunning victory over Princeton on April 26, the Big Red would have had to share the conference crown with both the Tigers and Brown, as all three teams would have finished with a 5-1 conference record. Instead, just Cornell and the Bears split the title.

For the second year in a row, Cornell has had two men's lacrosse players make the final cut for consideration for the 2008 Lowe's Senior CLASS Award as **Mike Corbolotti** and **Danny Nathan** have been named among the 10 finalists.

The award, presented annually to NCAA Division I student-athletes each year in eight sports, focuses on the "Four C's" of classroom, character, community and competition.

This marks the second year for the men's lacrosse division of the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award. Cornell goaltender **Matt McMonagle** was the inaugural winner in 2007.

The 10 finalists will be placed on the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award men's lacrosse ballot for a nationwide vote beginning April 3 and concluding May 5. Fan balloting, available on the award's official website www.seniorclassaward.com, will be combined with votes from coaches, media and sponsors to determine the recipient of the award.

The 2008 award winner will be announced and presented with the prestigious Lowe's Senior CLASS Award trophy during festivities surrounding the NCAA Men's Lacrosse Championships, scheduled for May 24-26. The Lowe's All-Senior All-America Team, based on final results of the balloting, will also be recognized.

AT THE HELM — Jeff Tambroni is in his eighth season as head coach of the Big Red and owns a career record of 84-29. His winning percentage of .743 is the second-best among the nine coaches who have served as head coach at Cornell, ahead of the legendary Richie Moran (.680) and behind the all-time leader Ned Harkness (.972).

TAMBRONI AMONG THE BEST — Head coach Jeff Tambroni currently ranks second in the nation among active Division I coaches with a .743 winning percentage. Georgetown head coach David Urick is the nation's leader (.752).

NIGHTTIME AT THE BOZ – The Cornell-Hobart rivalry reached a new milestone on May 2, as the teams faced-off in the first-ever night game to be played at Hobart's legendary Boswell Field. The Big Red won the game, 15-7.

11-WINS – With the victory over Hobart, the Big Red has posted at least 11 wins in the past four seasons and five times overall during head coach Jeff Tambroni's eight-year tenure.

SINGLE-DIGIT SUCCESS – When holding its opponents to less than 10 goals, the Big Red is a perfect 10-0. Conversely, in Cornell's three losses this season, its opponent has scored in double-digits. The only game the Big Red has won in which its foe scored more than 10 goals was a 16-11 victory over Dartmouth.

ROOKIE OF THE WEEK – Shane O'Neill was named the Ivy League Rookie of the Week on April 28 for his efforts in the Big Red's 11-7 victory over Brown. O'Neill became the first Big Red men's lacrosse player to be named Rookie of the Week in over two years (Max Seibald – April 17, 2006). The freshman midfielder saw significant playing time vs. the Bears and scored perhaps the best goal of the day as he fought through his defender, eluded the slide and scored despite having a defenseman draped over his left shoulder to knot the game at 4-4. That goal, scored off O'Neill's only shot of the day, gave the Big Red tremendous momentum as it rallied to defeat the Bears and claim a share of the team's sixth-straight Ivy League title.

SOPHOMORE STANDOUT – In his first season as a starter, sophomore Ryan Hurley has proven to be one of the great young offensive threats in Big Red history. To date, his 57 points on the season are the most by a Cornell sophomore since Eamon McEaney tallied 96 points in 1975. Other than McEaney, the only other sophomore in Cornell history to register more points than Hurley has this year was Mike French (94 in 1974). In recent years, the only sophomore that has come close to matching Hurley's output was Sean Greenhalgh, who tallied 46 points in 2003.

ADDING ON – Senior John Espey has increased his production each and every season with the Big Red. As a freshman, he did not register a single point, but tallied one goal and two assists as a sophomore. His junior season, he was an offensive spark on the second midfield line with 10 goals and five assists. This season, Espey ranks fifth on the team in points with 15 goals and 10 assists.

NON-CONFERENCE WINS — Cornell is 21-3 in its last 24 regular-season non-conference games, dating back to the Big Red's 16-14 victory over Syracuse in the Carrier Dome on April 12, 2005. Two of those three losses during that span came at the hands of the Orange (2006, 2008), while the other came when No. 7/8 North Carolina beat Cornell, 13-8 at Fetzer Field on March 2, 2008.

FACE-OFF FEVER – The Big Red is succeeding in the face-off circle at a clip not seen in over 20 years, as the team has won the face-off battle in 12-of-14 contests so far this year, matching the 1986 season when it won the face-off battle in 12 games.

FINISHING STRONG – When leading at halftime, the Big Red is a perfect 8-0 on the season.

SIXTH SENSE — Cornell's six consecutive regular season Ivy League titles is the longest current stretch by any team in any conference.

SIX OF ONE ... — With its victory over Brown on April 26, 2008 the Big Red claimed at least a share of the Ivy League title for the sixth straight season, the longest stretch since winning 10 straight championships between 1974-83.

TURN OF THE CENTURY – With his two goals and one assist vs. Hobart, junior Max Seibald has become the 34th player in Cornell history to register 100 career points. With his 61 goals and 40 assists, he sits at 101 career points. Senior John Glynn is also looking for his 100th career point, with his 42 goals and 49 assists putting him at 91.

OPRAH'S BIG GIVE – Former Cornell University men's lacrosse player Stephen Paletta '87 was named the winner of Oprah's Big Give on April 20. After spending eight weeks competing to change the lives of complete strangers in the most creative and dramatic ways possible, Paletta was awarded a \$1 million prize, half of which must be used to continue helping others. A four-year letter winner for the Big Red defense, Paletta was a part of Cornell's 1987 national runner-up squad and was named a second-team All-American that season.

BACK-TO-BACK – The Big Red has not lost back-to-back games since the 2002 season when Cornell fell to Princeton and Brown on consecutive weekends.

ELITE COMPANY – Over the past five seasons, Cornell has been among the best in the nation, boasting the highest winning percentage of all Division I teams during that span (.792) and ranking fourth in number of victories (57).

NINE POINTS – Ryan Hurley had a career-day against Dartmouth on April 12, registering five goals and four assists for a personal-best nine points. The nine points was the most by a Big Red player since Andrew Collins had one goal and eight assists against Yale on March 22, 2003.

GOING STREAKING – Junior Max Seibald currently holds the longest point-scoring streak on the team and the fifth longest in the nation, having registered at least one point in the last 33 games, dating back to Cornell's 4-3 victory over Princeton on April 22, 2006. Other than that game vs. the Tigers, Seibald has been held without a point only one other time in his career, going pointless against Yale on March 25, 2006.

21 RUN – The Big Red hosted the fourth annual 21 Run on Sunday, April 27 at the Cornell Plantations. The event, which honors the late Mario St. George Boiardi who wore the No. 21 as captain of the Cornell men's lacrosse team, raised more than \$5,000 for the Family Reading Partnership of Ithaca. The 5K run was won by Sam Rosen, followed by Cornell sprint football quarterback Zak Dentes in second place, and former Big Red men's lacrosse player Ethan Vedder '07 in third. The first female to cross the finish line was freshman Madison McConnell, a member of the Cornell swimming team.

Matt McMonagle's 19 saves on May 12, 2007 against Towson was the most in an NCAA tournament game for Cornell since Justin Cynar's 19 saves in a 14-12 loss to Georgetown in 2000. Dan Mackesey holds the all-time record in tournament games with 28 saves, set against Maryland in the title game in 1976. McMonagle's 19-save performance is tied with Cynar and Paul Schimoler for the fifth-best Cornell performance in an NCAA Tournament game.

PLAYER OF THE WEEK – Ryan Hurley earned his second Ivy League Player of the Week honor on April 7 after his five-goal, one-assist effort helped Cornell defeat Harvard, 11-7. It was the second Ivy League honor for Hurley, who earlier this season led the Big Red to key wins over No. 20 Denver and Ivy League foe Yale.

FORTY GOAL MAN – With his four goals against Brown on April 26, Ryan Hurley became the latest 40-goal scorer in Cornell history. The sophomore attackman currently has 44 goals and is averaging 3.14 goals per game. There have been just 10 individuals since 1962 that have scored at least 40 goals: Tom Quaranto (45 – 1967), Mark Webster (50 – 1968, 43 – 1969), Al Rimmer (43 – 1971), Mike French (63 – 1974, 63 – 1975, 65 – 1976), Tom Marino (46 – 1977), Charlie Wood (43 – 1980), John Wurzbarger (49 – 1988), Chris Danler (49 – 1995), Sean Steinwald (44 – 2000) and David Mitchell (43 – 2006, 47 – 2007).

PIERCE PICK UPS – Sophomore Pierce Derkac has picked up at least one ground ball every game this season and has picked six or more ground balls three times this year, including a career-high seven vs. Harvard.

TROPHY HUNTING — The Big Red had two players nominated for the 2008 Tewaaron Trophy – John Glynn and Max Seibald. The Tewaaron acknowledges the top men's lacrosse player in the nation and is voted upon by coaches. The five finalists for the award are: Ben Rubeor (Virginia), Matt Danowski (Duke), Mike Leveille (Syracuse), Paul Rabil (Johns Hopkins) and Zack Greer (Duke). Seibald was named one of five finalists for the 2007 Tewaaron, becoming the first Big Red men's lacrosse player to make it to the final five and just the fourth second-year player to earn that distinction, joining Syracuse's Michael Powell (2002), Johns Hopkins' Kyle Harrison (2003) and Duke's Matt Danowski (2005), all of which won the award in their senior seasons.

CONFERENCE WINS — Cornell had its 14-game Ivy League winning-streak snapped after losing to Princeton on April 21. The 14 consecutive victories was the second-longest stretch in school history behind only its NCAA record 39-game streak from 1973-79. The 14 straight wins was also the longest active conference winning streak in the nation at the time that it ended.

SCORELESS HALVES – The Big Red defense held Penn scoreless for the entire first half of play on March 29, marking the second time this season that Cornell has shutout an opponent for back-to-back quarters (Canisius).

SCORELESS QUARTERS — In the 2007 season, Cornell held nine of its 16 opponents scoreless for at least one quarter of play, including overtime. In total, the Big Red held its opponents scoreless in 12 out of 65 periods, including its effort vs. Binghamton in which Cornell held the Bearcats scoreless for three quarters. This year, Cornell has held six of its 14 opponents scoreless for at least one quarter (10 of 58 periods, total).

HURLEY HURTS 'EM – Ryan Hurley's goal with one second remaining in overtime gave the Big Red an 8-7 victory over Yale in its Ivy League season opener on March 22.

DOUBLE THE OVERTIME – Cornell has played two overtime games this season, defeating both Navy and Yale in the extra session, 8-7. During Coach Tambroni's eight-year tenure, the Big Red has played two overtime games in the same season three times, winning both contests in 2004 and 2008, while going 1-1 in 2001.

CLOSE CALLS — Since the beginning of the 2003 season, Cornell is 18-4 in games that have been decided by a single goal, a mark that was raised as the Big Red defeated Yale, 8-7 in overtime on March 22 at Schoellkopf Field. The only blemishes during the stretch were a 6-5 loss to Navy in the 2004 NCAA quarterfinals, a 12-11 loss to Syracuse on April 11, 2006, a 10-9 loss to UMass in the opening round of the NCAA tournament on May 13, 2006 and a 12-11 loss to Duke in the national semifinal on May 26, 2007. Coach Jeff Tambroni is 21-10 in one-goal games during his tenure with the Big Red, including a 6-2 mark in overtime games.

THE HURLEY HAMMER – Ryan Hurley had a breakout game vs. Denver on March 18, registering a hat trick in the first 11 minutes of the game en route to a career-high six goals vs. the Pioneers. Hurley has registered at least four goals in six of the 10 games since that time.

HELPING HAND – John Glynn ranks 18th in the country and second in the Ivy League in assists per game (1.64 apg).

MEN IN THE MIDDLE – Cornell's midfield duo of John Glynn (.627) and Tommy Schmicker (.618) have been solid in the face-off circle for the Big Red this season, with the tandem ranking first and second, respectively, in the Ivy League. Glynn is fourth in the country and Schmicker would rank sixth, but falls just short of the minimum attempts required to be ranked. As a team, Cornell ranks fourth in the nation in face-off win percentage (.608).

SCORING MACHINE – Ryan Hurley ranks third in the country and first in the Ivy League with 3.14 goals per game. Max Seibald ranks 50th in the country and seventh in the conference with 1.79 gpg.

GROUND BALL GOBBLER – John Glynn ranked 10th in the country and third in the Ivy League with 5.21 ground balls per game.

MYERS MARKS 'EM – Senior goalie Jake Myers has become sharper in goal as the season has made double-digit saves in five of the past seven games.

(BIG) RED HOT OFFENSE – The Big Red ranks eighth in the country and first in the Ivy League in scoring offense, averaging 11.43 goals per game.

LOCK DOWN DEFENSE — Cornell ranks 18th in the country and fourth in the Ivy League in scoring defense, allowing only 8.07 goals per game.

GET TO THE POINT —Ryan Hurley ranks sixth in the nation and first in the Ivy League with 4.07 points per game, while John Glynn is 48th in the country and seventh in the conference with 2.79 ppg.

IN THE MARGIN —The Big Red ranks sixth in the country in scoring margin, defeating its opponents by an average of 3.33 goals per game.

IVY OPENERS – The contest vs. Yale on March 22 marked the 53rd Ivy League season opener for Cornell men's lacrosse. Since the league began play in the 1956 season, the Big Red has posted a 38-15 record in Ivy League openers, including a perfect mark of 8-0 during head coach Jeff Tambroni's tenure. More often than not, Cornell has met either Yale or Harvard in the conference opener, playing a different school on only six occasions.

GOALS GALORE – For the second time in the past two seasons, Cornell has scored 20 goals vs. an opponent, as the Big Red defeated Denver, 20-7. Last year, Cornell beat Penn, 20-5, reaching the 20-goal mark for the first time since the 1998 season.

NEUTRAL ZONE – Since the start of the 2006 season, the Big Red is 6-1 in neutral site games, with two victories over Notre Dame (Chicago, 2006 and Long Island, 2007), a single victory over Albany (Princeton, 2007), Navy (Long Island, 2008), Denver (Dallas, Texas) and Harvard (Foxborough, Mass.). The lone loss came at the hands of Duke in the 2007 national semifinal (Baltimore, Md.).

80 WINS — With the Big Red's 13-5 victory over Penn on March 29, 2008, head coach Jeff Tambroni notched his 80th career win, becoming just the third head coach in Cornell men's lacrosse history to reach that plateau. Tambroni reached the milestone in his 107th career game during his eighth season. The last Big Red coach to reach 80 wins was Richie Moran, who defeated Rutgers, 14-6, in his eighth season (1976) to achieve a 80-14 record.

QUICK HITS — Max Seibald and John Glynn teamed up to set a new school record when they scored consecutive goals just six seconds apart vs. Army on March 8. Seibald scored with 4:05 remaining in the third quarter and Glynn won the ensuing face-off, took it the length of the field and scored with 3:59 showing on the clock. The six second differential is also the second fastest in NCAA history for consecutive goals by members of the same team. The record of five seconds is held by Army's Rob Lewis and Justin Charise who teamed up for a pair of goals vs. Penn State on April 3, 1999, and Lawrence Booth, who scored two straight goals for Butler against Denver on April 23, 2004.

HARD START — Cornell opened the season with three straight nationally-ranked opponents and posted a 2-1 record, sandwiching wins over Navy and Army around a loss to North Carolina.

HARD HAT – Junior attackman Chris Finn has been selected to carry the Hard Hat for the 2008 season. The tradition of the Hard Hat began in the fall of 1999. Midway through the fall season, a player is selected to carry the Hard Hat for the year. The recipient is someone that the coaches feel demonstrates a blue-collar approach to the game of lacrosse; he is driven and selfless, not the most talented player on the field, but consistently the hardest worker. He puts the team first, and embodies how the coaches want Cornell players to act and respond on or off the field.

BALANCED ATTACK – Cornell has had at least 18 different players register at least one point so far this season.

FIVE IS RARE — When Cornell dropped a 13-8 decision to No. 7/8 UNC on March 2, it was the largest margin of defeat since the Big Red dropped a 14-4 decision to Georgetown during

the 2004 season. Just over one month later, Cornell fell to No. 1 Syracuse, 15-8, the most lopsided victory in the series since 1997. During Coach Tambroni's career (105 games), Cornell has lost by five or more goals only seven times.

HURLEY STEPPING UP – During his entire freshman season, Ryan Hurley tallied four points, a total he eclipsed in just the second outing during his sophomore season after tallying two goals and an assist vs. Navy and two goals at UNC. Hurley currently leads the team with 44 goals and 13 assists for 57 points on the season.

FINN FINISHES – Chris Finn scored the game-winning goal as the Big Red defeated Navy, 8-7 in overtime on Feb. 23.

FOR STARTERS – With its 8-7 overtime win against Navy, the Big Red improved to 59-50-5 all-time in season openers, including a 6-2 mark during Coach Jeff Tambroni's tenure.

OH CAPTAIN, MY CAPTAIN – Cornell's three captains for the 2008 season are seniors John Glynn and Danny Nathan, as well as junior Max Seibald.

NO. 42 IS NO. 4 – Junior Max Seibald was featured alongside Duke's Matt Danowski on the cover of the February edition of Inside Lacrosse magazine. The magazine used dual covers to feature the top-four players in the country with Seibald and Danowski on one, and Paul Rabil (Johns Hopkins) and Ben Rubeor (Virginia) on the other. In an article called "The Ballers" the magazine listed the 50 best collegiate players in Division I, placing Seibald fourth overall in the nation.

EVERYBODY'S ALL-AMERICAN – Cornell lost four All-Americans from the 2007 squad (Mitch Belisle, Matt McMonagle, David Mitchell, Eric Pittard), but returned four preseason All-Americans for the 2008 campaign – Max Seibald (first-team), John Glynn (second-team), Matt Moyer (third-team) and Danny Nathan (honorable mention).

PRESEASON POLLS – Cornell earned a No. 6 ranking in the USILA preseason coaches poll, before being selected to finish seventh in the nation, and second in the Ivy League, in the Inside Lacrosse and Face-Off Yearbook Division I preseason coaches' polls.

MONSTERS OF THE MIDFIELD – Last season, the midfield tandem of John Glynn and Max Seibald combined for the most assists by a pair of Cornell midfielders since 1970. Their 42 assists on the year were the most since Justin Redd and Joe Boulukos combined for 35 during in 2005. Since 1970, only four pairs of pure midfielders have reached the 30 assist plateau – Bob Henrickson and Craig Jaeger (37 in 1978), Redd and Boulukos (35 in 2005), Glynn and Seibald (42 in 2007) and Bob Shaw and Bill Molloy (30 in 1971).

SMARTY PANTS – Cornell has had six CoSIDA Academic At-Large All-Americans (Mitch Belisle '07, Tim DeBlois '04, Troy Gorman '99, David Key '01, Matt McMonagle '07 and Casey Stevenson '05), including four during Coach Tambroni's tenure. Unlike other Academic All-America teams in which the selections are all from the same sport, the At-Large men's team is highly competitive as it is comprised of athletes from fencing, golf, gymnastics, ice hockey, lacrosse, rifle, skiing, swimming, tennis, volleyball, water polo and wrestling. To be eligible, a student-athlete must be a varsity starter or key reserve, maintain a cumulative grade point average of 3.20 on a scale of 4.00, have reached sophomore athletic and academic standings at his/her current institution and be nominated by his/her sports information director.

RECAPING 2007 – The 2007 season proved to be one of the greatest in recent years as the Big Red was named the 2007 FieldTurf/NCAA Lacrosse Team of the Year. Cornell capped an undefeated regular season (13-0) with the program's first

trip to the national semifinal since the 1988 campaign. The Big Red, the fourth seed in the NCAA tournament, held the top spot in both national polls for the final nine weeks of the season and finished the year with a 15-1 record, one victory shy of the school record (16 in 1976) and eighth all-time in NCAA history for wins in a season. Cornell finished its Ivy League schedule with a perfect 6-0 record, winning its second outright league title in the past four years, garnering at least a share of the conference crown for the past five seasons.

COACHING AWARDS — Jeff Tambroni was named the 2007 FieldTurf/NCAA Division I Coach of the Year, while associate head coach Ben DeLuca was named the 2007 IMLCA's Assistant Coach of the Year.

LAST MAN STANDING — Cornell was the last Division I team in the nation to lose a contest in 2007, falling in the national semifinal on May 26. The Big Red amassed a 15-0 record and outlasted Albany, which opened the season at 11-0 before losing to Syracuse on April 20. Division III's Salisbury (23-0) was the only team to finish the season undefeated.

RIDING HIGH — Cornell finished the 2007 regular season ranked No. 1 in both the Nike/Inside Lacrosse media poll, as well as the USILA coaches poll. The Big Red took the top spot in the polls for the first time since the 1978 season and held the position for nine straight weeks.

CLEAN YOUR SLATE — Cornell's 11-8 victory over Brown on April 28 gave the Big Red a perfect 6-0 record in the Ivy League for the 15th time in program history. With the 17-4 victory over Hobart, Cornell finished the regular season undefeated for the ninth time in program history and the first time since 1987.

FOUR SURE — Cornell has had its share of Final Four appearances in NCAA team competition over the years, as the 2007 men's lacrosse team brought the total of national semifinal appearances to 20.

AND THE WINNER IS ... — For the first time since the 1977 season, the Big Red swept the defensive honors given by the United States Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association, as Mitch Belisle '07 earned the Schmeisser Cup as the Outstanding Defenseman in Division I, while Matt McMonagle '07 won the Ensign C.M. Kelly, Jr. Award as the Outstanding Goaltender in Division I. The duo become the second and third players, respectively, to earn USILA awards during Head Coach Jeff Tambroni's tenure, as Joe Boulukos '06 earned the Lt. Donald McLaughlin, Jr. Award as the nation's Outstanding Midfielder in 2006. The unanimous Ivy League Player of the Year, McMonagle became the Big Red's first Kelly Award winner since Dan Mackesey earned the honor in 1977, while Belisle became the first Cornell defenseman to win Schmeisser Cup since Chris Kane (1978).

LEAVE IT TO THE PROFESSIONALS — Five Cornell players were selected in the 2007 Major League Lacrosse Collegiate Draft, including David Mitchell (eighth overall) and Matt McMonagle (10th), who were taken in the first round. Mitch Belisle (12th) was selected in the second round, Brian Clayton (23rd) was taken in the third round and Eric Pittard (44th) was selected in the fifth

The Richard M. Moran Head Coach of Cornell Lacrosse
 Eighth Season as Head Coach • 11th Season at Cornell
 Hobart '92

Over the span of 10 seasons, one man has been a leading force in Cornell's return to national prominence in lacrosse. The progression is far from over, but head coach Jeff Tambroni is pleased with the journey. After serving as an assistant coach with the Big Red from 1997 to 2000, Tambroni became the second Richard M. Moran Head Coach of Men's Lacrosse in June 2000. The position was endowed in March 2000 by gifts from Cornell lacrosse players and numerous friends of the program.

Tambroni's time with Cornell has been filled with milestones and a resurgence of one of the greatest programs in the history of collegiate lacrosse. The 2007 FieldTurf/NCAA Division I Coach of the Year, Tambroni finished last season ranked fourth among active Division I coaches in winning percentage (.737) and hit the 70-win plateau in the final Ivy League game of the season, defeating Brown, 11-8. He became the third head coach in Cornell men's lacrosse history to reach that mark, and he did it in his 95th game, faster than all but the legendary Richie Moran, who reached the mark in his seventh season (1975) to achieve a 70-13 record. The 2004 *Ithaca Journal* Male Coach of the Year and three-time national Coach of the Week, Tambroni has overseen six consecutive seasons with nine or more wins on East Hill, including three campaigns in which the team achieved 11 victories, and last year, in which Cornell finished with 15 wins.

Last season, the Big Red made its fourth-straight trip to the NCAA tournament, and fifth overall during Tambroni's seven-year career.

During his head-coaching tenure, Tambroni's players have earned 27 first-team All-Ivy honors, including four Ivy League Player of the Year awards and two Rookie of the Year selections. He has also helped his players earn a

combined 30 All-America honors, including defender Ryan McClay '03, who was a four-time All-America selection and earned a spot on the first-team in 2002 and 2003. Under Tambroni's tutelage, Joe Boulukos '06 became the first Big Red player in nearly a decade to win one of the major USILA honors, earning a share of the Lt. Donald McLaughlin Jr. Award as the nation's top midfielder. In 2007, the Big Red swept the defensive honors given by the USILA, as Mitch Belisle '07 earned the Schmeisser Cup as the Outstanding Defenseman in Division I and Matt McMonagle '07 won the Ensign C.M. Kelly, Jr. Award as the Outstanding Goaltender in Division I. That same season, sophomore Max Seibald was named a finalist for the Tewaaraton Trophy, becoming the first Cornell player to earn that distinction.

Tambroni also stresses excellence in the classroom, resulting in seven of his players earning *ESPN The Magazine*/CoSIDA Academic All-District honors, including Casey Stevenson '05, who was named to the 2005 Academic All-America second-team, and Belisle and McMonagle, who earned Academic All-America first-team honors in 2007.

Over the past four seasons, Tambroni has led Cornell to the heights of Division I, boasting the second highest winning percentage of all Division I teams during that span (.793) and ranking third in number of victories (46).

The 2007 season proved to be one of the greatest in recent years as the Big Red capped an undefeated regular season (13-0) with the program's first trip to the national semifinals since the 1988 campaign. Cornell earned the fourth seed in the NCAA tournament after holding the top spot in both national polls for the final nine weeks of the season. The team finished the year with a 15-1 record, one victory shy of the school record (16 in 1976) and eighth all-time in NCAA history for wins in a season. The Big Red finished its Ivy League schedule with a perfect 6-0 record, winning its second outright league title in the past four years and garnering at least a share of the conference crown for the fifth straight year. Cornell's five consecutive regular season Ivy titles is the longest current stretch by any team in any conference. The team was also a perfect 7-0 at home, upping the Big Red's record on Schoellkopf Field to 39-8 during Tambroni's tenure. Cornell finished the year ranked first in scoring offense (14.00 gpg.) and scoring margin (7.00 gpg.) and fifth in scoring defense (7.00 gpg.).

The remarkable 2007 season came on the heels of a 2006 campaign in which the Big Red went 5-1 in the conference, winning a share of its fourth-straight Ivy League title, the longest stretch since Cornell won 10-straight championships between 1974 and 1983. The Big Red also won 11 games in the regular season for the first time since the 1987 team went into the NCAA tournament with an undefeated record of 11-0. Under Tambroni's guidance, Cornell rose as high as No. 2 in the nation in the March 20 *Inside Lacrosse* media poll, and found themselves among the national leaders in scoring offense, scoring defense, scoring margin, man-up offense and man-down defense.

The 2005 campaign was one of the best in Tambroni's young career as the Big Red went undefeated in Ivy League play and won its first outright Ivy title in nearly 20 years. Cornell finished the regular season with a 10-2 overall record and took a spectacular 12-11 opening round victory

assistant coach at Loyola College during the 1997 season, helping guide the Greyhounds to a 10-4 record, as Loyola appeared in its 10th consecutive NCAA tournament. He assisted in all facets of the program, including recruiting and on-field coaching. Tambroni served as the Greyhounds' offensive coordinator, focusing specifically on extra-man situations.

Before moving to Baltimore, Tambroni was an assistant coach at Hobart for three seasons, helping the Statesmen to the 1994 NCAA Division III championship game. He was an assistant as the team made a successful transition to NCAA Division I competition in 1995, finishing the season ranked 12th in the nation.

A former three-time All-American at Hobart College, Tambroni was named first-team All-America as a senior, after scoring 33 goals with 24 assists. He was a second-team All-America selection in 1990 and 1991, as the Statesmen won the NCAA Division III championship. He was named most valuable player of the 1990 championship game when Hobart defeated Washington (Md.) College 18-6. Tambroni had his most productive season in 1990, scoring 69 points on 38 goals and 31 assists. He concluded his college career tied for seventh on Hobart's all-time scoring list with 202 points. He left the Statesmen ranked sixth in assists (99) and 12th in goals (103).

Tambroni graduated in 1992 from Hobart with a bachelor of arts degree in American studies.

Following his graduation, Tambroni, a native of Camillus, N.Y., coached the Heaton Mersey Lacrosse Club of the English Lacrosse Union for one year. He also served as a visiting coach for the Czech-American Lacrosse Foundation in Prague in the summer of 1996. Tambroni was a former high school All-American while playing at West Genesee HS in Camillus.

Tambroni resides in Ithaca with his wife, Michelle, and their daughters, Carissa, Madison and Ella.

over Towson in the NCAA tournament before falling to eventual national runner-up Duke, 11-8. For his efforts, Tambroni was honored by being named the co-head coach for the Division I North squad at the 64th annual North-South Classic.

During an emotional 2004 campaign in which the team dealt with the death of a teammate, Tambroni led Cornell to a share of the conference title and earned the Ivy League's automatic bid to the NCAA tournament, where the Big Red came within one goal of the NCAA semifinals for the second time in three seasons.

After leading the Big Red to a 7-6 record and a second-place finish in the Ivy League in his first season as head coach in 2001, he took the program further in 2002, posting an 11-4 record and earning a berth in the NCAA tournament, where Cornell defeated Stony Brook and fell in a tight 11-10 battle with Virginia in the national quarterfinals. The win over Stony Brook marked the Big Red's first NCAA tournament win since 1988. The Ivy championship in 2003 was the program's first since 1987, when the Big Red won it outright. Tambroni has also helped Cornell earn key regular season wins over Syracuse at Schoellkopf Field in 2000 and in 2002, when the Orange lost only twice all season en route to the national championship.

Tambroni joined the Cornell lacrosse staff as an assistant coach in September 1997. Cornell improved in each of his first three years, going from 6-7 in 1998 to 7-6 in 1999 and 10-4 in 2000. The Big Red earned its first berth in the NCAA tournament since 1995 during the 2000 campaign, dropping a hard-fought 14-12 decision to Georgetown in the first round.

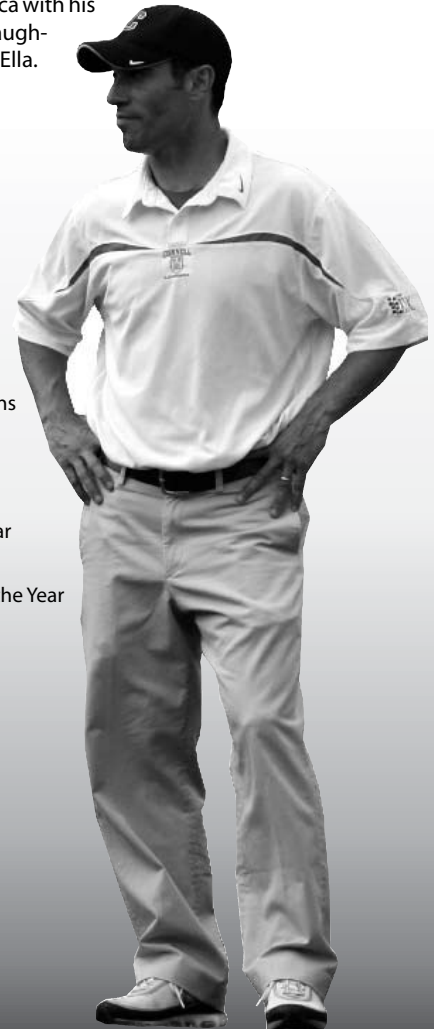
